

10458 Ice Cream Trip With Bluey

Immerse preschoolers in role-play fun with the Ice Cream Trip with Bluey toddler toy (10458). Preschoolers enjoy imaginative play as they go on a LEGO® DUPLO® adventure using this vehicle playset to recreate scenes from the Bluey TV show. This gift for toddlers brings hours of family fun. Toddlers drive the toy car – which fits both the Dad and Bluey figures – to get ice cream. This creative-play toy lets preschoolers act out the excitement of traveling somewhere special as well as the satisfaction of getting a treat. Toddlers learn to recognize numbers by choosing how many scoops they want and stacking the right number of bricks. They'll develop color-sorting skills pairing the toy scoops with the flavors and practice their fine motor skills by attaching the ice cream to the cones. Through pretend play, LEGO DUPLO Bluey sets let preschoolers and their families not only act out fun everyday activities but also help them understand how these activities make them feel.

The packaging captures the cheerful, everyday adventure of Bluey and Dad going out for ice cream. The front of the box shows the assembled LEGO DUPLO scene in a sunny park-like setting, with the orange and light blue family car on the right and the ice cream stand on the left. The build consists of 22 pieces in total, 2 minifigures, and is recommended for ages 2+. Once finished, you will have an ice cream shop and a car. The set consists of 2 unnumbered bags and 1 instruction booklet.

Welcome to text-based instructions from Bricks for the Blind! Before you start building, here are some terms we may be using:

- In Front of/Front: towards you.
- Behind/Back: away from you.
- Up: towards the ceiling.
- Down: towards the floor.
- Stud: the bump on a LEGO brick. Example: A 2x1 brick has two studs on it.

- Vertically: with the longest side going from front to back
- Horizontally: with the longest side going from left to right.
- Upright: pointing up towards the ceiling.
- Standing upright: The piece is perpendicular to the ground, like a wall.
- Lying flat: The piece is parallel to the ground, like a piece of toast which fell off the table.
- That one/ppp: previously placed piece.
- Plate: piece with studs.
- Tile: smooth piece without studs (unless otherwise specified)
- A jumper plate is a 1x2 plate with a single stud on top, or a 1x3 plate with only two studs on top.
- Hollow stud: a bump on a LEGO brick with a hole, which allows attaching bars.
- "Anti-stud" is a term for the portion of a LEGO piece which accepts studs, like the bottom of a plate or brick.
- Symmetrically: a mirror image. Example: If you place a 2x1 brick with technic connector on the front wall at the right, connector to the front, and then place another such piece symmetrically on the back wall, at the right, the technic connector of the second piece should point to the back, since it will be placed symmetrically.
- Centered-vertically: even amount of space in front of and behind piece
- Centered-horizontally: even amount of space left and right of piece.
- Row: studs lined up horizontally (left to right/side to side).
- Column: studs lined up upright or vertically (top to bottom/back to front).

Additionally, it is worth mentioning that besides the printed visual instructions that come with each kit, a PDF version for the set's instructions is always available online at [\[https://www.lego.com/en-us/service/building-instructions/10458\]](https://www.lego.com/en-us/service/building-instructions/10458). This might help a sighted building partner that may want to follow along or low vision users that may benefit from viewing the instructions on a personal device where they can zoom in on content and use assistive technologies to enhance the visuals.

Sorting the pieces:

To begin a successful build, it helps to sort the pieces into groups, bags, or small containers. Have a friend or family member do this in advance following the instructions below. You will see that the pieces should be sorted according to the building steps in the kit. Doing this in advance makes locating the pieces for each step easier. See below on how to sort the pieces to correspond to the steps in this set. Number the containers using letters A-Z, numbers, or meaningful names. The parts will be sorted into one or a small number of steps in the instructions. Example: Steps 1-3 means collect all the parts used in steps 1, 2, and 3 and put them in one container.

This LEGO set comes with 2 unnumbered bags and 1 instruction booklet. Sort the pieces into groups or piles as described below. Note that where there are multiple colors of the same brick in a step, the colors will be split into 2 groups to make telling the difference easier for the builder!

LEGO includes a few spare parts in case you lose something. Set these into their own group away from the rest, in case you need them later.

Building Instructions

The instructions begin with several pages of preamble.

BUILDING THE BIG SKILLS TODDLERS NEED

We believe in big starts. Our big bricks are designed for little hands to master. When toddlers' creativity is set free, their opportunities to learn become endless. We call it Learning Through Play. And it inspires every LEGO DUPLO set. Based on thorough scientific research, each set helps young minds develop both IQ skills (cognitive, physical, creative) and EQ skills (social, emotional). Let all toddlers Start Off Big. LEGO DUPLO sets are categorized into benefit territories that match toddlers' ages and developmental stages.

LOGICAL THINKING + EXPRESSING YOURSELF

LEGO DUPLO sets in this territory can help toddlers master a range of skills, including how to care for others and understand feelings, learn to compare, match, and sort things, and play out familiar situations. When you play along and offer instructions and guidance, you create a safe, creative space that encourages toddlers to learn.

The next pages tell the story of the set. It is a sunny day. Bluey and Dad are in their front yard, in front of their orange car. Dad is to the left and has a speech bubble above him with a picture of an ice cream. Book 1:

Group 1 – Ice cream cone, menu board, cash register, Bluey, and Dad

Page 8. Place 1 tan cup with printed waffle cone pattern in front of you, so that its handle faces to the right. Then, place 1 bright pink cupcake top with swirling icing on top of the ppp, which represents a strawberry ice cream scoop.

Next, place 1 white 1x2x2 brick upright with print in front of you. The print shows three ice cream cones. The first one (on the left) has one strawberry ice cream scoop and has a bright pink "1" underneath. The second one (in the middle) has strawberry and vanilla ice cream scoops and has a yellow "2" underneath. The last one (on the right) has strawberry, vanilla, and chocolate ice cream scoops and has a brown "3" underneath. Ask a sighted friend to make sure that it is oriented properly.

Continue by placing 1 light aqua 2x2 brick in front of you. Then, place 1 light bluish gray 2x2 slope brick with keypad and buttons printed pattern on top of the ppp, so that it slopes to the front.

Lastly, stand the Bluey and Dad minifigures in front of the cash register.

Group 2 – Car

Page 9. Place 1 bright light blue 4x8 car base vertically in front of you, so that its side with an upright handle faces to the back. Then, place 1 reddish orange car body vertically on top of the ppp, so that its 2x2 studded surface faces to the back. Lastly, place 1 bright light blue 1x2 brick with round top horizontally on the back row of the ppp.

Group 3 – Ice cream stand

Page 10. Let's build the ice cream stand. Place 1 white 4x8 plate horizontally in front of you. Locate 2 light aqua 2x4 bricks. Place the first one vertically under the 2 leftmost columns of the ppp. Take the second one and repeat symmetrically on the right.

Page 11. Place 1 bright pink 2x4 brick vertically on the 2 leftmost columns, which represents the strawberry ice cream. Then, place 1 bright light orange 2x4 brick vertically to the right of the ppp, which represents the vanilla ice cream. Next, place 1 reddish brown 2x4 brick vertically to the right of the ppp, which represents the chocolate ice cream. Lastly, place 1 white 2x2 brick to the right of the 2 back rows of the ppp.

Page 12. Place 1 white 2x2 tile with round column and 2x2 plate on top of the ppp. Next, place 1 lavender umbrella top on top of the ppp. Continue by placing 1 tan cup with printed waffle cone pattern on the front right corner, so that its handle faces to the right. Then, place 1 bright light orange cupcake top with swirling icing on the 4th column from the left on the front row. Lastly, place 1 reddish brown cupcake top with swirling icing on the 5th column from the left on the back row.

We are done with the construction! Have fun together with Bluey and Dad having some delicious ice cream.

At the end of the instruction booklet, you will find a page advertising 2 sets. The classic LEGO and LEGO DUPLO logo sit on the top left corner, while the bottom right corner shows Bluey's logo, together with Bluey himself. On the left, we have set 10458 (Ice Cream Trip with Bluey, this set), while on the right side we have set 10459 (Bluey's Family House with Memory Game). The background is comprised of a sunny, cloud-dotted blue sky. Afterwards, you will find the set inventory and on the last page you will find an invitation to share feedback.
